If you don't know the answer, that's OK - you can research it! ask your parents, check on the Internet or ring your grandparents and ask them.


- When you've solved all the puzzles, from number 1 all the way to number 7, then the secret word is shown in the blue boxes.

- looks like a lost horse
- has a dripping wet mane
- lives near rivers, lakes or the sea


WARNING: If you get on a Kelpie's back they will pull you into the water with them

One day he was out riding and met a beautiful maiden with long golden hair, riding on a snowy white horse. Her name was Niamh. He immediately fell in love with her and promised to go with her to her home, Tír Na nÓg. His mother and father begged him not to go, in case he never came back, but he went anyway.


They rode across the land and when they reached the sea, Niamh's horse neighed three times and the sea parted to allow them to cross. They rode faster than the wind and finally reached a fair land, Tír Na nÓg. Oisín married Niamh and they lived for 300 years in the most beautiful place Oisín had ever seen.


