## School Council



The School Councillors met with Mrs Clarke today to present the results of the recent Pupil Voice Survey. The survey focused on playtimes, school dinners, seating space and the school farm.

Key Stage 2 School Councillors (Alfie, Jacob, Summer, Sam, Thomas, Holly, Rohan, and Willow)
Thank you for meeting with us today. We wanted to share the general outcome of the school council survey with you. We are pleased to say, that overall the responses were positive and that our school is a happy place to learn and play. The school councillors each took a question and reviewed the most common answers. We narrowed the answers down by highlighting the responses that we thought stood out as the most interesting. We identified the most relevant responses, with a focus on outside play and school dinners.
In the school council survey, we asked where everyone likes to play outside. The most frequent response was the school field. The other areas included the playground, trim trail and the green. However, some people also said they like to play games such as Kings Square. We also asked, 'what else would you like outside during playtimes?'

Our most popular five responses were:
more time in the spinney
more shelter
more sports equipment
more basketballs, footballs, and rugby balls
more games that involve everyone.
In the survey, we also asked questions about the school dinners and packed lunches. We looked at the responses for whether children enjoyed hot dinners. Most children gave positive feedback about what they like, including gravy, potatoes, and pizza. One person even suggested that we should have fish and chips every day! However, we know how important it is to have a balanced diet with a variety of food.

Although most people said they thought the school dinners were yummy and taste good, we did have some suggestions to improve the hot dinners. These responses included more food choices such as tuna or salad wraps and more soft drinks available. However, we did identify two responses that we thought were important to share with you. The first is that the hot dinners needed to be of better quality, sometimes they are not warm enough. The second suggestion is that there should be alternative dietary choices which include dairy-free options, available. Overall, the comments were positive. These included portion sizes and nicely presented food. We feel confident that most people enjoy the school dinners and that there is enough variety of food every day.

## Key Stage 1 School Councillors (Sam, Loki, Eva, and Francesca)

Thank you for meeting with us today, Mrs Clarke. We have looked at the responses from the school council survey. The school council want to share the most frequent feedback for outside seating from children with packed lunches and the ideas for the school farm.

Most responses from children were that they wanted more seating on the field, with picnic benches and blankets so that when it is wet on the seats or ground, they do not get soggy or muddy clothes.

We also asked for other suggestions to improve the outside area. One idea included taller school fencing to stop the balls from going over the fence. However, another proposal was that football, on the playground, should not be played because other children might get hit by the ball. One person suggested that a proper pitch should be marked out on the field so that children could play there instead.

In the school council survey, we asked what everyone would like to see on the school farm. The responses were very positive. Most children suggested flowers, strawberries, vegetables, and herbs in the garden. When we asked what animals should be on the farm, most children voted for guinea pigs, chickens, rabbits, and ducks as the school farm animals.
