





The Ivory Bangle Lady

In 1901, a **sarcophagus** was unearthed in York, England. Within it, the skeletal remains of an ancient human lay among beautiful pieces of jewellery. While there are many things that we now **think** that we know about this person, her name is not one of them. For this reason, she **is** lovingly known as the Ivory Bangle Lady.

What Was Found

Much of what we think we know about the Ivory Bangle Lady has been deduced because of the personal items that were found with her.

- Bangles made from jet and ivory were unearthed. They were probably bought from a local market but could have been made in Italy and imported.
- Glassware was found in the form of a bracelet, two earrings, a small jug and a mirror. Glass jewellery was very popular in Roman Britain.
 This glassware shows that the Ivory Bangle Lady was aware of her appearance.
- The sarcophagus contained a bone plaque which was carved with Latin words which translate into English to mean 'Hail, sister! May you live in God.' This implies that the Ivory Bangle Lady could have been Christian.

Did You Know...?

The Ivory Bangle Lady migrated to York later in her life and she was one of many migrants with African heritage who made the city their home.

Studying Her Bones

Osteoarchaeologists have been able to find out a lot about what the Ivory Bangle Lady would have been like. Her skeleton shows that she would have been 152-160cm tall and was between 18 and 23 years old at the time of her death. She lived during the later part of the 4th century AD.

Glossary

sarcophagus: A stone coffin.

osteoarchaeologists: People who study

human skeletons.

Key Vocabulary

glossary: An alphabetical list of words and their definitions in relation to a specific topic.

paragraph: A chunk of writing that usually deals with a single idea or theme.

present tense: A tense that expresses an action that is currently going on or generally always exists.

sub-heading: A heading given to a small section of writing to tell you what that section is about.

third person: Third-person writing is from another person's point of view or as an outsider looking in. Third person uses pronouns such as: 'he', 'she', 'they' or 'it'.
